Over the past decades, he created and refined the "motive power annual" type of publication, preparing successive editions on the current diesel fleet of the Southern Pacific. Save the Turtle-back Cars

The North Texas Historic Transportation organization would like to preserve for future generations three Dallas streetcars in danger of being scrapped. These cars were owned by the Mckinney Avenue Transit Authority. These cars were built to a common Stone & Webster company design known as the turtleback due to the shape of the car roof.



MATA had planned to eventually restore these bodies back to working condition. But over the years they just continued to sit in storage. Now McKinney Ave. is short on shop space. They would like to build a new car repair and restoration shop on the land where these car bodies are stored.

An Early Railroad Accident

This accident comes from a picture of page one of the very first issue of *The Dallas Morning News*, October 1, 1885 and is in the Spring 1997 issue of Legacies magazine.

"Derailed By a Broken Axle Bloomington, IL, Sept. 30th. At an early hour this morning rather a serious accident occurred on the Indianapolis, Bloomington and Western Railroad at a place called Downs, a short distance from this city. Owing to the breaking of an axle of an engine, the train was thrown from the track, the engine and four coaches being completely demolished. Eight or ten passengers were quite seriously hurt, but no one was killed outright."

More Rail Trivia

In America, the most frequent and most severe accidents centered on bridges. The worst accident of the 19th century was caused by the failure of a bridge over the Ashtabula River northeast of Cleveland in Ohio (also called the Ashtabula Horror or the Ashtabula Bridge Disaster). On December 29, 1876, two locomotives hauling 11 railcars of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railway carrying 159 passengers plunged into the river in deep snow when the bridge gave way beneath them. The wooden cars were set fire by their heating stoves, but no attempt was made to extinguish the fire. The accident killed ninety-two people, and was the worst rail accident in the U.S. until the Great Train Wreck of 1918.



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- The Howard Street Tunnel in Baltimore was the first electrified section of the United States. City anti-smoke ordinances prevented steam
 engines from operating in the area, so the B&O turned to electric power.
- The Consolidation-type engine was far and away the most popular freight engine of the 1800s. It was powerful and durable, and most remained in service for decades.
- The 4-4-0 American type locomotive was one of the premier passenger locomotives of the 1800s.
- Demurrage is defined as a penalty charge assessed by railroads for detention of cars by shippers or receivers beyond a specified free time.

Jon also brought his copy of the Katy Historical Society current edition featuring a restored 1870 wooden parlor car and the ornateness of the car interior.

Jason Davis from Klondike, TX dropped by for a visit this evening to tell us about the upcoming 9th Annual Cotton Belt Regional Railroad Symposium to be held Friday-Saturday, Oct 3-4 at TX A&M University-Commerce, TX. He invited the chapter to consider holding our October meeting there so we can participate and stay overnight to attend both days. Featured keynote speaker will be Joe Strapac who will cover Cotton Belt diesels on Friday night and Cotton Belt steam power on Saturday. The event is free and will feature additional presentations, discussions, artifact displays, etc. A luncheon on Saturday will be provided to those who RSVP. Member Jerry Nunn reported a huge crane is positioned on W. Lancaster in Ft. Worth in preparation for installing the piers and supports for the W. Lancaster 3rd track expansion from downtown to Centennial yard. He reported the Tower 55 track realignment project is scheduled for completion in September and that Amtrak trains 21/22 are currently terminating at Ft. Worth during the construction.

VP Trips & Events Skip Waters gave an update on the Keller, TX museum problems. A current proposal is to scrap the box car and flat car and repaint and letter the commuter car. The Keller museum group had placed a grant request with us but have placed the request on hold pending finalization of a \$15K grant from UP.

The chapter's book project, David Bernstein's 'Southern Pacific's Eastern Lines 1946-1996' has been signed off and production is underway. We are planning on a November release date in time for Christmas sales.

In National news, Skip reported on what was currently known and we that are awaiting the counting of the votes later this month.

After a short break our program started at 9pm. It was a DVD documenting the selection of and movement of Big Boy 4014 from Pomona, CA to Cheyenne, CO in preparation for its total overhaul, rebuild and return to the rails as one of UP's steam excursion engines. Dave Gramm, Secretary.
