Union Pacific Derails TRE's Morning Plans

The Union Pacific and Trinity Express did not plan a "photo opp" nor a railfan special on Thursday, Jan. 11, 2007, but there was lots of rail news just the same. A Union Pacific derailment caused rerouting of passengers on the Trinity Railway Express (TRE) via Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) buses.

The derailment involved two locomotives and four cars, but all remained in an upright position, in the early morning hours near Dallas Union Station, the DART/TRE northbound and the UP westbound tracks.

About 400 early morning riders on the TRE eastbound train were transported by DART buses from the Medical/Market Center stop to Union Station. Passengers could then connect to DART buses, and light rail trains which were not affected by the derailment.

The Dallas Morning News and Joe Faust a spokesman for Burlington Northern indicated that the train was eastbound to Teague, traveling less than 20 mph, and the derailment is under investigation. **Source:** The above is summarized from 1/11/2007, Dallas Morning News article by staff writer Linda Leavell at: http://www.dallasnews.com/sharedcontent/dws/news/localnews/stories/0111 07dnmetderail.2cc41d33.html

KCS Returning to Historic Diesel Colors

Kansas City Southern railroad's new EMD SD70ACe locomotives that are on order will be painted in a variation of the railroad's historic red, yellow, and Brunswick (extremely dark) green passenger-train livery. A version of those colors is worn by KCS's "executive F-unit diesels" and business cars, but freight locomotives are gray with yellow stripes. It is believed, but not yet confirmed, that this new scheme will be applied to future KCS locomotives orders, and to existing units as they are shopped.

KCS' business cars always retained the historic colors, and the F units that KCS boss Mike Haverty brought in to pull the expanded fleet in 1996 were painted to match them (Brunswick green is dominant, vs. yellow on the old E units). When passenger service was re-introduced in 2001 on KCS' newly acquired Panama Canal Railway, the cars and the ex-Amtrak F40's purchased for it were painted in the historic passenger colors, and KCS also applied the livery to an F unit donated in 2006 to the Union Station museum in Kansas City.

Great Plains Railroads Slammed By Weather; Amtrak Chief Detours

A second winter storm hit Denver the last week of 2006, whipped through the Great Plains, eastern Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, and western Kansas. All this wreaked havoc with rail operations.

BNSF was hit hardest, but Union Pacific and Kyle also were disrupted. Owing to the storm, BNSF's Raton Pass route - traversed by Amtrak trains 3 and 4, the Chicago-Los Angeles Southwest Chief, but little freight - was buried. BNSF rerouted Amtrak over the Transcon, BNSF's main freight route, between Belen, N.M. (near Albuquerque), and Topeka, Kans.

To serve Albuquerque, a major passenger and service point, they used the line back south to the Belen area, joining the Transcon there. Amtrak and BNSF provided alternate crew arrangements and pilots, making crew stops at Clovis, N.M., Amarillo, Texas, and Wellington, Kans. The trains used the freight route between Wellington, Kan., and Emporia (Ellinor), Kan., instead of going via Wichita and Newton. The last regular passenger train over the route via Amarillo was Santa Fe's San Francisco Chief, which ceased upon Amtrak's 1971 inception.

General Rail News

C&NW 400 72nd Anniversary

January 2, 2007, marks the 72nd Anniversary of the inauguration of one of America's great passenger trains, Chicago & North Western's 400 between Chicago and St. Paul/Minneapolis. The train debuted on January 2, 1935, powered by 4-6-2 Pacific type locomotives rebuilt for high-speed operation. Able to make the 409-mile run from Chicago to St. Paul in 390 minutes, the train got a leg up on competitors Burlington Route (which began its Twin Zephyrs on April 21, 1935) and Milwaukee Road's Hiawatha (which made its first run on May 29, 1935).

The C&NW train was an immediate success and spawned an entire fleet of 400s on the system that reached lowa, Upper Michigan, and South Dakota as well as the "corridor" operation between Chicago and Milwaukee. The train kept earning profits into the 1950s, when road and airline competition took its toll. The original route of the 400 is largely intact today, except for short areas in the Twin Cities and Milwaukee not used by freights. Union Pacific purchased C&NW in 1995 and operates the route today, the "hottest" train on which is an overnight Roadrailer UP operates for Triple Crown Services.

Nickel Plate Berkshire 763 Purchased By Ohio Central

Ohio Central Railroad System has purchased Nickel Plate Road 2-8-4 Berkshire-type No. 763 from the Virginia Museum of Transportation, Roanoke. Several options were discussed for the swapping of steam locomotives to bring the big "Berk" back home to the Buckeye State, where it ran in fast freight service until Nickel Plate dieselized in 1958, but both organizations were in agreement that a straight cash sale would be better suited for all concerned. Details of the sale were not announced.

When NKP dieselized its road power in 1958, the 763 was stored in the yard at Bellevue, Ohio, for future donation to that town. However, after the 1964 merger of NKP into Norfolk & Western, N&W took the locomotive to its headquarters city of Roanoke, where 763 has been displayed until now.

Ohio Central has nine other steam locomotives, three of which are operational, and will bring 763 to its Morgan Run Shop this spring. Barring unforeseen mechanical hurdles, OC shop forces will rebuild the 763 for service. - John B. Corns

Public Transportation Ridership Climbs "On Board" In 2006

The American Public Transportation Association announced that transit ridership increased by nearly 3 percent in the first nine months of 2006 as Americans took 7.8 billion trips on public transit.

Light rail had the highest percentage of growth among all modes of transportation, with an increase of 5.4 percent. The areas reporting double-digit increases in light rail ridership were: Salt Lake City (23.3 percent); Minneapolis (22.6 percent); New Jersey (16.3 percent); Philadelphia (11.9 percent); and Sacramento, Calif. (10 percent). Light rail ridership that almost achieved double-digit increases included Buffalo, N.Y. (9.2 percent) and Houston (9 percent).

Commuter rail grew by 3.2 percent from January through September 2006. The largest increases were: Harrisburg, Pa. (12.1 percent, on Amtrak's Keystone Service); Chesterton, Ind. (12.0 percent, on the South Shore Line); Miami (11.7 percent, on Tri-Rail); Dallas (11.3 percent, on Trinity Railway Express); and New Haven, Conn. (9.9 percent, on Connecticut DOT trains).

Heavy rail (subway) ridership increased in the first nine months of 2006 by 2.8 percent. The largest increases were in Boston (12.9 percent); Los Angeles (12.2 percent); Jersey City, N.J. (9.9 percent, on PATH trains); and Staten Island, N.Y. (9.5 percent). Complete ridership report at www.apta.com/research/stats/ridership.

2006 Another Record-breaking Year For U.S. Freight Railroads

In 2006, U.S. freight railroads completed a record-breaking year by carrying 17,380,102 carloads, up 1.2 percent (213,751 carloads) over 2005. Full-year 2006 U.S. intermodal loadings were 12,282,221 units, up 5.0 percent (588,709 trailers and containers) over 2005's 11,693,512 units, which had been the previous highest annual total ever, the Association of American Railroads reported.

Total 2006 freight volume was estimated at 1.74 trillion tonmiles, up 2.5 percent from the previous record set in 2005. Coal paced U.S. rail traffic in 2006, rising 4.7 percent (324,476 carloads) to 7,282,608 carloads for the year. In 2006, coal accounted for 42 percent of total non-intermodal U.S. rail carloadings. Canadian rail carload traffic, which includes the U.S. operations of Canadian railroads, totaled 3,844,456 units, down 1.9 percent (73,473 carloads). In 2006, chemicals, grain, metallic ores, coal, and motor vehicles and equipment were the five highest volume commodities carried by Canadian railroads. Canadian intermodal traffic rose 5.1 percent for the full year to 2,356,978 trailers and containers.

Kansas City Southern dé Mexico (formerly Transportación Ferroviaria Mexicana - TFM), a major Mexican railroad, carried 592,025 carloads in 2006, down 2.5 percent (14,989 carloads), intermodal traffic rose 0.2 percent (344 units) to 212,420 trailers and containers.
